Dear Parents/Carers,

How quickly we seem to be hurtling towards Christmas! In the past week, at Barrow 1618, we have had lots to celebrate; the children have truly championed all of our Barrow values.

Firstly, how proud I felt of the School Council members who joined the Broseley community on Sunday in the memorial garden to read a poem and join in with the Remembrance service! They read beautifully, demonstrating our values of **care** and **respect**.

The poppy display in the hall looked fabulous; thanks to the children for their creative contributions which were especially appreciated during Remembrance Day Assembly in school.

The pupils who took part in the cross-country at William Brookes yesterday showed that they were winners all-round: not only did they achieve their personal goals but our teams were placed second and third out of all of the schools and one of our children came first. Without exception, they all did incredibly well, demonstrating our values of **ambition**, **teamwork** and **resilience**.

Children have also shown their **curiosity** in the classroom, outdoors and beyond this week:

- in Yew class, the pupils been curious outdoors by searching for and collecting seeds for their clay seed pots;
- in Elm class, children have been asking questions about the moon and finding out more about it to write poems – they have also discovered new things about the weather;
- Ash class have not only found out about and created their own 'Wonders of the World' structures, but taken them into the forest to film using perspective to give the impression of their actual size;
- in preparation for their visit to Shrewsbury School, Oak class have been carrying out research about Charles Darwin, based on their own lines of enquiry.

In the next few weeks, the children will be involved in choosing a family of Barrow Bears; there will be a Barrow Bear to represent each value, reminding us of the importance of these in school as well as out in the wider world. We will be looking to dress each of the six

bears in a T-shirt with a symbol that signifies their value sewn onto it. If any you feel you have the skills to be able to help with this, please let us know. We also, want our new values to be visible around school and in the grounds, through a variety of media, so we would welcome your ideas and expertise.

I will be sending out a survey next week to discover what you would like to see in the parents' area of our new website which is beginning to take shape.

This week, saw the return of Cookery Club, which is extremely popular and brilliantly run by Sally Hobday. If there is anyone else who is willing to run – or help with - a club, please contact the school office.

You will be aware that tomorrow is Pudsey Day; we look forward to seeing the children dressed-up and ready to embrace the occasion. Thanks to all of you who have donated to Children in Need so far.
